Mark Pavola Begins a New Chapter in His Life

After serving as interim and then senior pastor at Bayside for nearly nine years, Mark Pavola has resigned to serve God as a missionary/church planter in the Central Hillside area of Duluth, Minn.

On July 16, Senior Pastor Mark Pavola, 48, stepped to the podium, and with tears in his eyes, announced that he was resigning as senior pastor of Bayside Baptist Church. He explained God was calling him into a new season and a new chapter of his life to serve as a missionary/church planter.

On Sunday, Nov. 5, Pavola's last day in the pulpit, the Bayside congregation celebrated the growth of the church under Pavola's leadership. They also celebrated as Pastor Tom Bush was installed as interim senior pastor.

Officially under the supervision of Glenn Herschberger, executive director of Church Planting for Converge Great Lakes

in Madison, Wis., Pavola is laying the ground work for planting a church in the Central Hillside of Duluth, Minn.

For several years, Bayside Baptist had sought to start a church in the Central Hillside area at the Encounter Building, 201 E. 1st Street in Duluth. The ministry was called Bayside on the Hill.

Pavola, who served 10 years as executive director of the Youth for Christ-Encounter at this same location before coming to Bayside as pastor, said the Bayside on the Hill efforts have been phased out.

"That ministry was good," he said. "It was key to knowing what we should and shouldn't do in this new church plant. We saw many lives touched during that time, and we have kept those relationships. Many of those folks now attend Bayside Baptist."

The new church plant may be in a similar community, but it will have a new name and a new identity. Pavola's role during November and December has been building ministry partners.

Pavola said all of the Converge churches in the area will be partnering in the Central Hillside church plant in some

Each of the 88 boxes contained a 10 to 12-pound turkey, a 5-pound bag of potatoes, one can of green beans, one can of corn, one can of turkey gravy, one can of cranberry jelly, one box of stuffing, one apple pie, one tub of cool whip, one bag of rolls, one roll of aluminum foil, one aluminum roasting pan, directions on how to cook a turkey and a Christmas card from Bayside.

On Saturday, Dec. 16, Help Ministry Chair Terri Hammerbeck and 26 packer volunteers met at the church to put the food items in boxes – assembly-line fashion. Food was purchased at Super One at the best possible rate. Then, 19 people delivered the Christmas dinners to residents at Royalton Manor, Catlin Court and 17 individual homes.

Hammerbeck said Ted only had just over 30 feathers last year. She is very thankful for all the people who gave, prayed and helped in any way this year.

"The stories of grateful tears, the prayers shared with those who received a box and the utter joy from the recipients are what make Ted the Turkey so incredibly

Swedish Immigrants Plant the Seeds

for Bayside Baptist Church

Hello Baysiders,

Do you ever wonder about the beginning of things? We have many great advances in our world today, but the one that made the best and biggest change is God's organization of His church.

To narrow it down to a more personal



level, what happened to bring about this church, Bayside? Credit the pietistic movement back in the 1700s, when a deep spiritual hunger developed across the world in defiance of the sterile, ritualistic, state-run churches.

As persecuted countrymen emigrated to the United States in the late 1800s, Bayside's Swedish forefathers were among them and brought their evangelistic zeal to their new country.

Superior was also in the throes of a population boom, having gone from 650 people in 1880 to 12,000 by 1890, with

many seeking religious freedom and/or the "free land" provided by passage of the Homestead Act.

As desire for God's word grew in the hearts of those Swedish immigrants, contact was made with Temple Baptist (today Lincoln Park Baptist) in Duluth for help in organizing worship services. The first services were held at the Carpenter School on 6th and Hammond Avenue during the brutally cold winter of 1887-1888. Imagine traveling across the frozen bay of Lake Superior in a horse-drawn sleigh with the winds whipping across your face and body just to encourage a fledgling congregation of less than 10 people.

But our God is not limited by weather or small groups wishing to be a ministering church for their community. This was just the beginning.



Church Directory to be Updated in 2018

As mentioned, Ron Herman has a gift of woodworking skills and donates his time and the materials because he, too, has a heart for life and babies.



Believe it or not, the entire tradition of the girl-asksboy dance originates from a comic strip written by Al Kapp. In the famous cartoon-turnedmusical "Li'l Abner," there was a designated day in November when unmarried women could chase bachelors around the town; if they caught them, so the story goes, the men were obliged to marry their pursuers.



According to the story, first mentioned in a November 1937 edition of Al Kapp's famous comic strip, Miss Sadie Hawkins was "the homeliest gal in all them hills" and this fateful day was her favorite -- and the town bachelors' most dreaded -- day of the year. way, either through prayer or financial support. He added that there are multiple churches outside of Converge that have expressed interest as well. He is also identifying parachurch ministries, such as Youth for Christ for example, to work together for the kingdom in ways they haven't before.

"I'm building relationships with businesses in the Central Hillside," he added. "There is also a unique connection with the medical community in Downtown Duluth, an unexpected interest and potential partnership."

Pavola is also building individual personal support--people who would like to partner with him financially or in prayer support. The building of all these partnerships will be ongoing.

Beginning in January, Pavola will build a Launch Team by identifying people who would like be part of seeing this church started. The Launch Team will meet from January to the Fall 2018, looking at a mission, a vision, goals and core values. The goal is to begin public services in the Fall of 2018.

"The key is building the right foundation,"

Pavola said. "And, the foundation is built on Acts 1:21-23, which says, 'When they had preached the gospel to that city and had made many disciples, they returned to Lystra and to Iconium and to Antioch, strengthening the souls of the disciples, encouraging them to continue in the faith, and saying that through many tribulations we must enter the kingdom of God. And when they had appointed elders for them in every church, with prayer and fasting they committed them to the Lord in whom they had believed.'

"The heart of this is that this area needs a community of light," he added. "It needs Jesus' presence in terms of a church community to bring the hope of Jesus into an overall fairly broken and dark part of our community."

In addition to planting churches, Pavola said there were two other components to his ministry. One is "apologetics training" to equip the full body of Christ to share their faith in a variety of different contexts. The other is "making young disciples." He added that the Lord has put kids, youth and young people back into his love scope.

"Loving these young ones is what drew

me out of the world of business," said Pavola, who graduated in 1991 from the University of Wisconsin-Superior with a major in business and marketing. "This love is a major part of my ministry at home and will be a part of my ministry going forward."

Pavola's ministry will have a logo with the letters "map." "p" is for church planting; "a" is for apologetics training; and "m" is for making young disciples.

"I will use this 'map' to guide me," he said. "If whatever others ask of me doesn't fit into these three areas –planting churches, apologetics training or making of young disciples—it is not what God has called me to do. So, He has really solidified my 'map' and how I'm going to live out that

incarnate Gospel life of Jesus."

Pavola was raised in a Christian home in Duluth, Minn. His mother led him to the Lord at a very young age. He is grateful for his family, and a mom and dad who walked out their faith. Mark and his wife, Andrea, have been married 23 years. They have five children: Andrew, 16; Tirzah, 14; Selah, 9; Joshua, 5; and Aubrey,2.

Do you need some good news? Do you know someone who needs good news? Bring them with you as you come and check us out!


